RIO DELL CITY COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING MAY 7, 2013 MINUTES

The regular meeting of the Rio Dell City Council was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by Mayor Thompson.

ROLL CALL: Present: Mayor Thompson, Councilmembers Marks, Wilson and Woodall

Others Present: City Manager Stretch, Chief of Police Hill, Finance Director

Beauchaine, Community Development Director Caldwell, Wastewater Superintendent Chicora and City Clerk Dunham

Absent: Water/Roadways Superintendent Jensen (excused)

#### CEREMONIAL MATTERS

Swearing in and Seating of Newly Appointed Councilmember Gordon Johnson City Clerk Dunham performed the swearing in and seating of newly appointed Councilmember Gordon Johnson.

# Resolution Honoring former City Councilmember Bud Leonard

Mayor Thompson said it is a great honor to have a representative from Assemblyman Wesley Chesbro's office here to present the resolution.

Sofia Pereira, Field Representative from Assemblyman Chesbro's office came forward and presented to former City Councilmember Leonard, a framed resolution honoring him for 18 years of dedicated service and active participation at City Council meetings, Planning Commission meetings and other external boards. It was noted that his knowledge and research of historical maps and deeds was invaluable to the City, and that his light-hearted attitude and sense of humor will long be remembered.

Bud thanked Ms. Pereira and the Council for the commendation and said it was a pleasure serving the community in such a unique place as Rio Dell.

# Recognition to Hilda Talavera for Commendable Performance

Chief of Police Hill said he would like to recognize Hilda Talavera for her assistance as an interpreter on behalf of the Police Department during a recent tragic accident. He said with her assistance they were able to collect critical information that was extremely helpful in aiding the department in the investigation. She was presented with a Civilian Service Award for her outstanding performance under very uncomfortable circumstances which surrounded the incident.

# **PUBLIC PRESENTATIONS**

Karen Chase, 480 Edwards Dr. addressed the Council once again regarding degradation of the Rio Dell River Bar. She indicated that she had presented her concerns to the City Council at the April 16, 2013 meeting but as of today she has not had any feedback from the City.

She thanked the police department for responding to their calls and said since the gate was installed, the activity on the river bar has improved however, it is still occurring. She said quad runners and four wheel drive vehicles are still racing up and down the river bar and tearing up the vegetation. She said she is once again asking for feedback from the City regarding a possible solution to the problem. She asked who is responsible for removing debris on the river bar.

She then provided a second set of pictures which were taken on May 5, 2013 to compare with the first set of pictures. She said the pictures reflect increased dumping including marijuana waste and evidence of campfires being built next to vegetation.

She said she will be addressing the City Council on a monthly basis regarding this issue.

Mike Chase commented that people don't realize that the upper side of the river bar is all silt. He reported a recent incident with drunken individuals coming up Edwards Dr. fighting and threatening each other. Also dirt bikes and quads are racing up and down Edwards Dr. and by the time the police can respond to the call, they are gone. Another concern is that individuals are leaving empty tubes (whippets) on the river bar.

Carol Theuriet thanked Chief Hill for taking care of the situation that occurred on her property on April 24<sup>th</sup> and said the manner in which he and his officers handled it was very admirable. She also thanked Hilda Talavera for her assistance in acting as an interpreter.

On behalf of the Eagle Prairie Arts District, she then invited everyone to attend "Children's Arts on the Avenue" to take place on Saturday, May 11, 2013 from 5-8 pm at the Eagle Prairie Elementary School Gym. She said there will be s trophy given to the Best of Show for grades K-4 and a \$100 cash prize for Best of Show for grades 5-8. She said the kids' enthusiasm is what keeps her going. She added that the reason many citizens choose to live here is because of the City Council and wonderful police department.

Councilmember Wilson asked that Item No. 5 Departmental Work Plans for 2013-2014 be removed from the consent calendar and placed under Special Call Items for separate discussion. Likewise, Councilmember Marks asked that Item # 7 Approve Employment Contract Amendment with Chief of Police be removed.

Motion was made by Marks/Woodall to approve the consent calendar including approval of minutes of the April 16, 2013 special meeting; approval of minutes of the April 16, 2013 regular meeting; approval of minutes of the April 23, 2013 special meeting; approval of Resolution No.

1201-2013 amending Resolution No. 1158-2012 adopting the Operating Budget for FY 2012-2013; and approval of Pay Request No. 14 to Wahlund Construction/Sequoia Construction Specialties in the amount of \$70,645.74 for work related to the Wastewater Treatment Plant Upgrade and Disposal Project. Motion carried 5-0.

City Manager Stretch announced that the city engineer was unable to attend so this item will be moved to the May 21<sup>st</sup> regular meeting.

# Departmental Work Plans for 2013-2014

Councilmember Wilson asked if the Work Plans only apply to the end of this fiscal year; City Manager Stretch explained they all relate to the 2013-2014 fiscal year with the exception of the finance department.

Councilmember Wilson commented that it seems like there are a lot of tasks the finance department needs to accomplish with a small staff and questioned the possibility of hiring a temporary employee to help. City Manager Stretch said the plan was to have the vacant position in the finance department filled by now however, the recruitment is taking longer than expected.

Councilmember Wilson then referred to the City Clerk's *Special Project List by Priority* in regard to exploring the concept of an electronic (paperless) filing system and said he would like to see it be moved to the top of the list as he felt it would be very beneficial. City Manager Stretch explained the expectation is for staff to undertake all of the tasks on the lists stating that they are all realistic goals and the tasks were quantified.

Councilmember Woodall commented that the method in which the work plans were presented makes it easier for the Council to see how much time it actually takes for each project; City Manager Stretch said it is a good management tool for everyone.

Councilmember Johnson noted that the available hours for special projects for the Chief of Police reflects a negative balance and asked for clarification; Chief Hill commented that he will be meeting with the City Manager and making some adjustments.

Councilmember Marks commented on update of the Garbage Ordinance and asked what the criteria are for the update. City Manager Stretch noted that one idea being considered is to establish city-wide collection. Councilmember Marks said that Nancy Diamond recently drafted an ordinance that may be helpful; City Manager said he will get a copy.

Motion was made by Wilson/Johnson to receive and file the Departmental Work Plans for FY 2013-2014 as submitted. Motion carried 5-0.

Approve Employment Contract Amendment with Chief of Police Hill
Councilmember Marks said she just wanted to state for the record that the contract amendment was reviewed by the city attorney.

Mayor Thompson stated when the employment agreements were approved approximately two years ago, the pay scale was increased as well as employee retirement contributions. With approval of this amendment, the Chief will be compensated with cash. He said he has a recommendation for investment of the additional funds he would like to discuss with him.

Finance Director Beauchaine said she spoke to several different tax professionals and essentially this is what was decided since each tax year may change and is the best approach to allow him the flexibility to invest on his own.

Mayor Thompson expressed concern about maintaining the City's intent of the contract in regard to increased retirement benefits.

Finance Director Beauchaine stated the intent was to provide compensation for retirement.

Motion was made by Marks/Wilson to approve the employment contract amendment with Chief of Police Hill. Motion carried 5-0.

Approve Change Order No. 5 for Wahlund Construction/Sequoia Construction Specialties
Related to the Wastewater Treatment Plant Upgrade and Disposal Project Notice of Substantial
Completion

Finance Director Beauchaine provided a staff report and said essentially what the Change Order does is extends the substantial completion date on the project 550 days and the final completion date by 65 days. She said there have been project delays beyond the contractor's control related to the sludge dryer and transmission pipeline. She said the new project completion date is scheduled for December 4, 2013.

Councilmember Wilson asked if the intent is to simply extend the completion date by 65 days rather than grant the contractor's request for Notice of Substantial Completion. He also asked if the sludge dryer is on site.

Finance Director Beauchaine explained by granting a Notice of Substantial Completion, the City's warranty period would be shortened since the clock starts clicking from that date.

Wastewater Superintendent Chicora said the sludge dryer is on site and performance testing is taking place this week.

Councilmember Marks asked how things are going in regard to CalTrans permitting; Finance Director Beauchaine said the only delay is with the circulation of the Environmental Impact Report and stated it is scheduled to be on the next agenda of the State Lands Commission.

Councilmember Johnson asked when the change order will be brought before the Council; Finance Director Beauchaine said she would expect it to be presented in August or September.

Motion was made by Wilson/Marks to approve Change Order No. 5 for Wahlund Construction/Sequoia Construction Specialties related to the Wastewater Treatment Plant Upgrade and Disposal Project. Motion carried 5-0.

# Review/Approve City Councilmember Assignments to Various Boards, Committees, Commissions and JPA's

City Manager Stretch stated with the new Councilmember appointment, the Council needs to review the assignments to the various Boards and Committees and approve any changes the Council believes are appropriate. He said the Council may want to make changes to the current assignments at this time or, discuss the assignments and defer the decision until the next regular meeting on May 21, 2013.

Mayor Thompson suggested the following changes to the current assignments:

• HCAOG - Thompson/Johnson

• Humboldt County Visitors Bureau - Marks/Wilson

• HWMA - Thompson/Johnson

• HTA - Thompson/Woodall

• LOCC - Johnson/Marks

Councilmember Marks suggested the approval of assignments be continued to the next regular meeting.

City Manager Stretch pointed out that Councilmember Wilson may not be able to attend meetings of the Humboldt County Visitors Bureau since they meet during lunch.

Council consensus was to continue the matter to the next regular meeting on May 21, 2013.

# REPORTS/STAFF COMMUNICATIONS

City Manager Stretch reported on recent activities in the city manager department and said he received notification from Cal-Recycle, informing the City that its 2007-2011 waste stream diversion is in compliance with SB 939 requirements of 50% diversion. He said had the City not met that requirement, the City would have been subject to a fine of up to \$10,000 per day. He commented that they cautioned in their letter that the requirement is set to increase to 75% by the

year 2020. He said he prepared a staff report for the next agenda to discuss a strategy on how that goal might be met.

Councilmember Marks asked if the recycle bins at City Hall count toward our waste diversion; City Manager Stretch indicated that they do and pointed out that currently only 41% of residents in the City have garbage service.

Councilmember Wilson asked how the numbers are calculated; City Manager Stretch said it is the weight of materials Eel River Disposal picks up versus what they take to the landfill in Anderson.

City Manager Stretch commented that economically it makes more sense for residents to have garbage service than to self-haul.

City Manager Stretch then reported on the recent California Supreme Court decision to uphold the right of local governments to ban medical marijuana dispensaries. He said approximately 180 cities across the state have enacted bans in recent years.

Chief of Police Hill reported on recent activities in the police department and began with review of the Monthly Police Report for March and April as submitted. The report contained a general summary of activity concerning Personnel, Training, Nuisance Abatement, Animal Control, and Incident/Arrest data.

He also reported that he and other staff members attended a MADD (Mothers Against Drunk Drivers) luncheon where Officer Harralson and a number of other local law enforcement personnel received awards from the Office of Traffic Safety (OTS). He said Officer Harralson was submitted for an award because he led the department in DUI arrests.

Councilmember Woodall asked if whippets are legal to sell; Chief Hill said they are only legal to sell to persons over the age of 18 and they need to have a legitimate reason to purchase them.

Carol Theuriet commented that there is a store in town that sells whippets by the case although they deny it.

Finance Director Beauchaine reported on recent activities in the finance department and said they were moving along at a snail's pace on the long list of projects but hopefully will be getting back up to speed soon.

Community Development Director Caldwell reported on recent activities in the planning department and said he will have the Draft Circulation Element to the Council at the June 4<sup>th</sup> regular meeting; at the request of the Assembly of God Church (The Journey), the Planning Commission meeting was moved up to May 14<sup>th</sup> for review of their CUP application prior to

their open house on the 18<sup>th</sup>; also on that agenda will be a recommendation for approval to amend the Non-Conforming Use Regulations of the RDMC. He also reported he will be meeting with the Chamber of Commerce on May 22<sup>nd</sup> regarding Sign Regulations; announced there is currently a vacancy on the Planning Commission and applications for those persons interested in serving must be submitted by May 16<sup>th</sup>; and said there has been a lot of interest over the last couple of weeks regarding the new medical marijuana regulations.

Wastewater Superintendent Chicora reported on recent activities in the wastewater department and said the sludge dryer was started up today and they ran the first batch of sludge. He said the sludge is now rated as Class A which opens doors to many avenues in regard to disposal. He said the City might want to think about selling the sludge to a fertilizer company stating there has interested expressed by a fertilizer company to purchase.

# COUNCIL REPORTS/COMMUNICATIONS

Councilmember Marks said with the new changes to take place on Wildwood Ave. with the upcoming landscaping project she would like to propose a study session to invite business owners, residents, and perhaps the fire department to hopefully alleviate any misunderstandings about the project. Council concurred.

Community Development Director Caldwell agreed to approach the Chamber of Commerce regarding a study session for signs and the Wildwood Avenue Landscaping and Improvement Project.

Councilmember Woodall announced that she will be in Colorado during the next Council meeting and asked Mayor Thompson to attend the HTA meeting in her place on May 22<sup>nd</sup>.

Councilmember Johnson said it is good to be here and thanked the Council for allowing him the opportunity to serve on the City Council.

Councilmember Wilson commented on Mike and Karen Chase's concerns regarding destruction of the river bar and said he was particularly concerned about the dumping of marijuana waste. He said even though the ordinance says you can't do these things on the river bar, it still is happening. He said Rio Dell is a beautiful place and the City is doing everything they can to promote the community and this destruction of the river bar is a problem that needs to be addressed. It was suggested a study session be held to address the problem.

City Manager Stretch recommended the problems be referred to him to address.

Councilmember Marks said she and her husband have been working on their property at 80 Monument Road and she has witnessed the same 6 or so motorcycles driving by over and over; stating she believes it is the same few people causing the problems.

Karen Chase thanked Councilmember Wilson for expressing so well her concerns.

Mayor Thompson reported that he took the City Manager and Finance Director to HWMA and met with staff to address some of his concerns regarding the financial position of the Authority and will be meeting again tomorrow to go over what was accomplished.

# RECOMMENDATIONS

Authorize the Finance Director to sign and submit the City's annual Transportation Development Act Claim.

# BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

Annually the City submits a Transportation Claim to the Humboldt County Association of Governments to access its annual Transportation Development Act funds. The City has completed the required process including holding public hearing to receive input from the community. The recommended proposal includes funds for the Humboldt Transit Authority in the amount of \$39,849 for transit services within the City, funds for Humboldt Senior Resource Center in the amount of \$6,500 for senior transportation services, and the balance of \$56,889 remaining for ongoing street maintenance and repairs. This year's claim includes increased funding for the City's HTA as the result of adding Sunday Trinidad service. The additional cost for our City is \$5,600 which reduced the availability of funding for streets repairs. HSRC did not request an increase from the prior year.

#### **BUDGETARY IMPACT**

Total TDA funds of \$103,238

# IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE CITY COUNCIL:

1. Ratify the City Manager/Public Works Director's action of 5-8-13 to direct the commencement of work by GHD on the permitting requirements and biological assessments related to approvals from the US Army Corp of Engineers, Regionals Water Quality Control Board and the California Department of Fish and Game for maintenance in the Eel River bed on the City's infiltration gallery (domestic water supply), and

2. Authorize the City Manager to execute any application, agreement, permit or other necessary document related to this matter.

# BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

The day after the last City Council meetings it came to the City Manager's attention that the Water Superintendent was alarmed due to the formation of a gravel bar over the top of the City's fresh water intake (infiltration gallery) in the Eel River just downstream from the Eagle Prairie Bridge. About 50% of the system's intake capacity had been lost and the remedy is to place equipment onto the river bed to clean out the gallery and dispose of the materials downstream; all activities requiring permits from State and Federal Agencies.

The City's contract Engineer, GHD, prepared the attached agreement for the preparation of environmental documentation and the regulatory permit application with the US Army Corp of Engineers, California Regional Water Quality Control Board and the California Department of Fish and Game. The processing of these permits through the various agencies takes time; therefore time was of the essence to get the necessary work underway then and not wait 2 weeks until the next Council meeting.

As you are aware, the City Manager in Rio Dell also holds the position of Public Works Director and under Ordinance 298-2012 he/she has the authority to commence public works projects of \$45,000 or less to "be performed by employees of a public agency by force account, by

negotiated contract or by purchase order". Under this authority, direction was given to GHD to begin the permitting work and environmental assessment immediately. Depending on whether the environmental assessment is met with a mitigated negative declaration or will require a more detailed biological assessment, , the cost of the work will likely be between \$24,000 and \$35,000.

The City Manager/Public Works Director requests that the City Council ratify his actions and authorize the City Manager to execute any application, agreement, permit or other document necessary for the required permits and environmental assessment.

The cost mentioned in this report is chargeable to the Water Fund and does not include any cost related to engineering, consulting services, labor or equipment to actually perform maintenance on the gallery and to remove and/or replace materials.

# **Agreement Between**

The City of Rio Dell And GHD Inc. For

CEQA, Permitting, and Biological Assessment for Emergency Riverbed Alterations Required for Water Infiltration Gallery during Low-Flow Conditions

This agreement is between the City of Rio Dell and GHD Inc. to provide environmental documentation and regulatory permit applications for the subject project. This agreement is based on a prime agreement between the City of Rio Dell and GHD Inc. dated October 10, 2003. All provisions of the prime agreement apply to this agreement unless noted otherwise in this agreement.

#### INTRODUCTION

The City of Rio Dell's water infiltration gallery was designed and constructed in such a way that it does not receive water from the Eel River during low flow conditions. The City has proposed to conduct gravel removal to direct low summer flows toward the infiltration system to prevent the loss of water supply to the infiltration gallery. The project would address the annual short-term emergency situation and allow for up to five years of gravel moving operations while a longer-term solution could be studied, designed, and permitted.

GHD Inc. will provide environmental consulting services for this project as outlined below.

# **SCOPE OF SERVICES**

This scope of services is defined by the following Tasks.

# Task 1: CEQA Environmental Review

# Option 1: CEQA Statutory/Categorical Exemption

As appropriate, GHD Inc. will coordinate with the City to prepare a narrative project description. If the City determines the project is exempt under CEQA Guidelines Section 15269 Emergency Projects, or Section 15301 Existing Facilities, GHD Inc. would assist in preparing the necessary documentation to draft and process a Notice of Exemption (NOE).

The Estimated Fee for Option 1 is: \$1,200

# Option 2: Initial Study/Mitigated Negative Declaration

GHD Inc. will prepare an Initial Study (IS)/Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) based on a Client-approved project description. GHD Inc. will rely primarily on existing studies, data, and technical reports collected from the Client. The biological analysis will be partially based on the Biological Assessment prepared under Task 5, below.



Research items are described in the following approach for the CEQA checklist categories, to be included in the IS/MND:

- Aesthetics The existing visual setting of the project site will be described. Visual
  elements of the proposed project components will be analyzed. This scope and cost
  estimate does not include visual simulations.
- Air Quality The potential air quality impacts associated with the project would be emissions from construction vehicles and equipment. The North Coast Air Quality Management District does not require the quantification of construction emissions but does require compliance with best available dust control measures.
- Biological Resources Potential biological resource impacts will be analyzed and described and, if appropriate, mitigation measures will be identified. A Biological Assessment for threatened and endangered species would be prepared (described in Task 5 below).
- Cultural Resources Potential cultural resource impacts will be described and, if appropriate, mitigation measures will be identified. A cultural-resource survey is not anticipated to be necessary for this project.
- Geology/Soils Geologic and soil impacts will be analyzed. A geotechnical report is not included in this scope of work.
- Hazards and Hazardous Materials A qualitative description of potential hazards and hazardous materials impacts will be provided. GHD Inc. will conduct a database search through Environmental Data Resources, Inc. (EDR) and will access the California Department of Toxics Substances Control (DTSC) Cortese List to assess the proximity of known contaminated sites to the work sites. A Phase I ESA is not included in this scope.
- Hydrology/Water Quality Potential impacts of the project on water quality and hydrology will be identified. This scope does not include detailed hydrologic or bathe metric studies.
- Noise The existing noise environment at the project sites will be described and nearby sensitive receptors identified. The potential noise impacts associated with the project would be identified and discussed. The scope does not include noise measurements or a noise study.
- Public Services and Utility Systems Existing public services and utilities in the vicinity of the project site will be described based on information to be obtained from the City.
- Transportation/Circulation Daily vehicle trips to and from project site during active project construction will be discussed. A traffic study is not a part of this scope of work.

It is assumed that the GHD Inc. will circulate the IS/MND according to the City mailing list (distribution of up to 30 copies). GHD Inc. will develop a Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Plan and prepare (MMRP) a Notice of Determination (NOD).

It is anticipated that GHD Inc. will respond to up to five (5) letters of comment (with up to four specific comments within each letter) from public/agency/City representatives related to the ISMND that require a minimal level of response (i.e. no new/additional technical studies or analysis).



The Estimated Fee for Option 2 is: \$15,000

# Task 2 - Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) 404 Permit

GHD Inc. will complete the Section 404 permit application, including preparation of figures and graphics, and submit to the County for draft review. The project would likely qualify for a USACE Nationwide No. 3 - Maintenance permit. Following incorporation of City comments, GHD Inc. will revise the draft application into final submittal package. The final USACE application package will then be submitted to the USACE Eureka district office.

Assumption: This scope of work of work does not include coordination with agency staff after submittal of application.

The Estimated Fee for Task 2 is: \$2,500

# Task 3: Regional Water Quality Control Board (RWQCB) 401 Water Quality Certification Application

GHD Inc. will prepare a draft RWQCB 401 certification application including preparation of figures and graphics, and submit to the City for draft review. Following incorporation of comments, GHD Inc. will revise the draft application into final submittal package. The final 401 certification application package will then be submitted to the RWQCB district office.

Assumption: This scope of work of work does not include coordination with agency staff after submittal of application.

The Estimated Fee for Task 3 is: \$2,500

# Task 4: Department of Fish and Wildlife (DFW) Streambed Alteration Agreement

GHD Inc. will prepare a DFW Streambed Alteration Agreement application and submit to the City for draft review. Following incorporation of comments, GHDInc. will revise the draft application into final submittal package. The final application package will then be submitted to the DFW district office. The City would be responsible for any permit fees.

Assumption: This scope of work of work does not include coordination with agency staff after submittal of application.

The Estimated Fee for Task 4 is: \$2,500



Task 5: Biological Assessments (BA)

GHD Inc. will complete a Biological Assessment (BA) to federal standards and provide to the City for coordination of Endangered Species Act (ESA) Section 7 consultation between ASACE and NOAA. The BA will assess federal endangered, threatened, or candidate species identified in the USFWS database for the appropriate quadrangle as well as other federally listed species which are known to occur or could occur in the project vicinity. The BA will define the action area, assess potential impacts for each species, and make a determination for each species (no affect, may affect but not likely to adversely affect, or may affect and likely to adversely affect). For species with a "may affect" determination, mitigation measures will be identified to avoid or minimize potential impacts.

As necessary based on project impacts and species information, a species-specific analysis of State listed species will be prepared and submitted to the City for use in negotiating any necessary species protection measures from DFW.

The Estimated Fee for Task 4 is: \$12,500

GHD proposes to complete Tasks 1-5 of the above scope of services within 90 days after receiving authorization to proceed. Please be aware that the schedule may be changed by factors beyond GHD Inc.'s control such as regulatory agency and public input.

# COMPENSATION

This project will be billed on a time and materials per GHD Fee Schedule in effect at the time services are performed. We will assist the City up to the budgeted amount of \$35,000 and not exceed that amount without written authorization by City. Charges will be invoiced monthly and due within 30 days. # IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE CITY COUNCIL:

Give staff direction to research and prepare options for the development of a strategy to meet the impending State (2020) 75% solid waste diversion requirement.

# BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

Attached to this report is a May 2, 2013 letter from CalRecycle, Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery, informing the City that its 2007-2011 wastestream diversion was compliant with State Assembly Bill 939 (AB 939) requirements set at 50%. The City just did meet that requirement. If it hadn't, the City could have been subject to a fine of up to \$10,000/day.

The letter goes on to say that we should be concerned about continuing to meet the minimum diversion requirement when the economy rebounds because businesses produce more, consumers buy more and construction waste increases. Also, the State recycling requirement is set to increase to 75% by the year 2020, which will be challenging for any community.

A fact that jumps right out without much analysis is that our records indicate that the City has on the average month the potential of 1,442 utility accounts in the City, as compared to Eel River Disposal's (ERD) records that show that they have 591 monthly residential and commercial accounts, including recycling totes. Can it really be that only 41% of our residents and businesses subscribe to refuse and recycling collection services? If that is the case, it is a wonder that we achieved the 50% diversion mandate.

Staff is of the opinion that we should begin to study options available to us now, engaging the public in the process as we go along and develop a strategy for implementation of the AB939 mandate at the earliest opportunity. City Council direction is requested on this issue.

We are writing regarding the status of CalRecycle's most recent review of whether the City of Rio Dell is in compliance with meeting AB 939 requirements (most importantly in terms of implementing diversion programs). Public Resources Code (PRC) Section 41825 specifies a schedule for this review and requires CalRecycle to make an independent evaluation and finding of whether each jurisdiction was in compliance with PRC Section 41780 during the review period. As a result of this review, CalRecycle may find that:

- 1) A jurisdiction is meeting the requirements of AB 939 because:
  - a. it has adequately implemented its diversion programs and has achieved the diversion requirement; or
  - while it has not achieved the diversion requirement, it has made a good faith effort to implement diversion programs; or
- 2) A jurisdiction has failed to adequately implement its SRRE and/or HHWE and the process should commence to consider whether issuance of a compliance order would be appropriate. Jurisdictions that fail to satisfy the conditions of a compliance order may be subject to a fine of up to \$10,000 per day.

The 2007-2011 Jurisdiction Review has been finalized. CalRecycle has found the City of Rio Dell is meeting the requirements of AB 939. We commend the City for continuing to dedicate resources to meeting the requirements of AB 939. Your efforts are helping to conserve natural resources, strengthen the State's economy, and reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

While we are pleased about this finding, we also want to note that as the economy rebounds businesses will likely produce more, consumers will buy more, and construction will increase. While this would be great news, we consequently also expect that more solid waste will be generated and discarded. As a result, continuing the City's diversion programs is critical to ensuring continued compliance with AB 939, as well as implementing the requirements of the Mandatory Commercial Recycling law. Based on the jurisdiction review analysis, CalRecycle management has identified some areas of assistance that may become challenging and could impact the City's ability to meet the AB 939 requirement in the next Jurisdiction Review cycle. The areas for assistance include:

- Implementing and monitoring of Mandatory Commercial Recycling.
- Implementing the California Green Building Code Standards adopted by the California Building Standards Commission.
- Obtaining and analyzing program data to assess the effectiveness of programs and target efforts.
- Exploring City-wide, universal recycling collection.

To ensure that the City is poised to implement mandatory commercial recycling and to continue implementing its diversion programs to handle the anticipated increase in solid waste disposal, Spencer

Fine from CalRecycle's Local Assistance and Market Development (LAMD) Branch will contact you to set up your annual site visit.

In conclusion, we are pleased the City of Rio Dell has been found to be in compliance with PRC Section 41780 as part of the 2007-2011 Jurisdiction Review. At the same time, we are looking to the future and want to work with you to ensure the continued success of the jurisdiction's overall diversion efforts. # IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE CITY COUNCIL:

Authorize the City Manager to Advertise for bids for two projects; the Wildwood Avenue Downtown Streetscape Project Improvement Project and the Davis and Wildwood Avenue Safe Routes to School Project

# **BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION:**

# Wildwood Avenue Downtown Streetscape Improvement Project

The plans and specifications for the Wildwood Avenue Downtown Streetscape Project Improvement Project are essentially complete. As you are aware, the project is structured to include a base bid and bid alternates to ensure that the base bid will be within the available budget. The bid alternates developed by the Council include a welcome sign at the south end of town, art pedestals, a town clock and tree grates.

The California Transportation Commission allocated the state funds programmed for the projects at their March meeting. Caltrans is currently preparing the Notice to Proceed with Construction and will issue the Notice once the federal portion of the funding has been authorized. We anticipate receiving that authorization the last week of May. Once the City receives the Notice to Proceed from Caltrans, it will advertise the project for bid. The following is the anticipated schedule through the construction of the project:

- Receive Notice to Proceed with Construction- 5/31
- Advertise for Bids-6/2
- Open Bids-6/21
- Council to Award Contract-6/25

- Notice to Contractor to Proceed with Construction-7/17
- Begin Construction-8/5 (After Wildwood Days)
- End Construction-11/5/2013

Construction is anticipated to take up to 90 days. This project is funded with State and Federal Funds with an anticipated construction budget of \$589,000. A copy of the final plans and estimate of probable construction cost is included in the Council's package.

# Davis and Wildwood Avenue Safe Routes to School Project

The plans and specifications for the Davis and Wildwood Avenue Safe Routes to School Project are essentially complete and the City was notified by CalTrans of the allocation last August 2012. The project includes the construction of a lighted pedestrian crossing to improve safety at the intersection of Wildwood, a bulb out at the existing trail crossing at 2<sup>nd</sup> and Davis Street on the south side of Davis Street, and additional sidewalk on the south side of Davis Street between Second and Third Avenue. This project is State funded with an approximate 10% city match and the anticipated amount available for construction is \$149,500.

Construction is anticipated to begin at the same time as the Wildwood Avenue Project and end approximately one month earlier. In this way the cost of construction management for both projects can utilize the same individual, thus leaving as much project monies available as possible for bid alternatives.

All other milestone dates are anticipated to be the same as the Wildwood Avenue Project. A copy of the draft final plans and estimate of probable construction cost have been reviewed by staff and are included in the Council's package.

The City Council will be provided with the bid results for both projects at the second council meeting in June (6-18-13) with a recommendation from staff to award the contracts to the lowest responsive and responsible bidders for each project.
